The New Zealand Nurses Organisation (NZNO) welcomes the opportunity to comment on the proposals for health services, models of care, and technologies the National Health Committee (NHC) is currently considering for inclusion in its immediate work programme.

As the leading professional and industrial organisation for nurses, kaimahi hauora and allied heath workers, who deliver health care across all settings, NZNO is keenly interested in cost effective, innovative programmes which will improve the health status of New Zealanders. We have briefly consulted with members and staff, including our professional nursing advisers, members of relevant specialist Colleges and Sections and Te Runanga o Aotearoa, the Māori arm of our bicultural organisation.

While all of the proposals have merit and are worthy of assessment, we have confined our feedback on the accompanying XLS speedsheet, to programmes which promote nationally consistent integrated care, and which are aimed at reducing health inequalities.

The eight most highly recommended programmes identified by NZNO are:

- 012 Alcohol Strategy
- 003 Nutrition Standards Information
- 008 Smoking Cessation Services

- 014 Fostering Security Programme
- 017 Diabetes Telehealth
- 019 Occupational Health Service
- 023 Rare Disorders Plan
- 024 Community Pain Services

We are also very supportive of the aims of 009 - Aged Models of Care but believe the development of differentiated models of aged care needs a much wider national conversation, including consultation with the workforces responsible for delivering care to the aged, than the proposal currently outlines. There are currently a number of models of care operating in a wide variety of settings for older New Zealanders, but we believe these cannot be assessed for quality, safety or cost effectiveness without the development of:

- nationally agreed standards of care;
- consistent acuity assessment tools; and
- staffing regulation in line with the standards for public safety and accountability set by the Health Practitioners Competence Assurance Act (2003) i.e. ensuring the appropriate number and skill mix of staff to meet health needs.

We trust our recommendations and the specific feedback will be useful, and we look forward to further communication from the NHC regarding your assessment of the programmes.
