HISO 10049.2 Videoconferencing Endpoint Naming Scheme; and HISO 10037.3 Connected Health User to Network Interface Specifications

The New Zealand Nurses Organisation (NZNO) welcomes the opportunity to comment briefly on the above standards, which we support.

The video-conferencing endpoint naming scheme is consistent with the ethos of Connected Health in providing clear, user-friendly standards that make use of existing formatting conventions, and are accessible and secure for individual health workers and health organisations. The only feedback we have had in relation to videoconferencing endpoints is the lack of hardware and personnel available to utilise this technology effectively. In this context, you may be interested in two NZNO publications by NZNO's nursing researcher and policy adviser Dr Jill Clendon, on Models of Health Care in New Zealandⁱ¹, the first of which investigates nurse perceptions of the importance of, and barriers to, effective information technology (IT) to improve health care; the second provides a set of clear principles that can be used to guide improvement in health services, including the use of IT.

The user to network specifications again seem eminently straightforward and logical, providing clarity, flexibility and security around the interface between the wide variety of individual and organisations networks.
