A successful NZNO Southern Regional Convention was held in Dunedin on April 12 attended by members from throughout the region. President Grant Brookes spoke on the barriers to member participation. Robyn Hewlett from the membership committee presented the proposal 'one member one vote'. This is a more democratic and equitable system and is designed to make your vote count. Grant presented 'our waka our way' with visual structural diagrams on developing models for members and management. Professional nursing adviser Lorraine Ritchie spoke on the role nurses play in advocacy, leading and caring for the most vulnerable in society. Glenda Alexander, industrial services manager and John Howell, educator, presented an interactive session which included the history of human rights worldwide and those enshrined in NZ law. Celeste Crawford and Lorraine Lobb. organisers, finished the day with a fun interactive activity on 'Health needs Nursing'.



The highlight of the day were the presentations by two amazing local nurses. Colette Blockley, nurse and teacher, presented 'South Sudan and Beyond'. In 2015/16 Colette worked in war- ravaged South Sudan teaching nursing and midwifery students where: there are very few nurses; maternal and infant mortality is the highest in the world; 92% women are illiterate; few children attend school, ancient tribal beliefs and practices are still prevalent; disease is rife; and women have no status.

Sue Whittaker, nurse, gave an amazing and insightful presentation on Servant's Health Centre in Dunedin. This free healthcare clinic is staffed by volunteers who provide compassionate, respectful, nonjudgmental care to the most vulnerable and high need in our society. The centre is designed around a fluid hierarchy–an inverted pyramid. This type of holistic healthcare can turn the lives of people around.

Kaiwhakahaere, Kerri Nuku, and chief executive, Memo Musa, were unable to attend.

A successful rally was held by NZNO members outside Dunedin Hospital on Friday 13 April to raise awareness of the plight of healthcare, safe staffing, poor nurses' wages and the impasse in talks over the proposed DHB MECA. This was in conjunction with other rallies held around the country. The rally was attended by many placard carrying members and was well supported by the public. Leaflets were handed out to the public and a petition was signed to send to the Minister of Health.
