NZNO Individual Member Matters - Ron Angel, NZNO Organiser

Organisers have the responsibility of dealing with various individual cases that involve our members, such as minor errors in practice, performance improvement plans, interpersonal conflicts or bullying, complaints from patients or colleagues, breaches of policy or procedures, and agreement related issues such as pay, leave, allowances, illness and ACC. Some cases also involve discrimination matters such as potential breaches of the Human Rights Act or H&S at Work Act. When a member faces a complaint, we follow these steps:

- We contact the member and listen to their side of the story with empathy and understanding.
- We review the evidence and the employer's investigation process to ensure they are fair and thorough.
- We advise the member of their rights and discuss options with them to decide the best course of action.
- We support the member in meetings and correspondence with the employer and advocate for their interests.
- We negotiate with the employer to attempt to resolve the matter without any negative outcome for the member or minimise the impact if possible.
- If there is a negative outcome, we attempt to negotiate the least punitive outcome and explore alternatives.
- If necessary, we may escalate the matter to a personal grievance and mediation, at times, depending on the complexity of the matter, with the help of our legal team.

At any one time we have 30 or more cases underway, with varying degrees of complexity and duration. Our goal is to always ensure our members side of the story are listened to, that they are treated fairly and respectfully, and to avoid as much as possible any negative outcomes that could affect their career or wellbeing.

Maranga Mai! Fund

The purpose of this fund is to provide members with assistance for professional development activities to enhance health care outcomes/provision in Aotearoa/New Zealand.

Members can apply for the following:

Option 1: Fees for undergraduate and postgraduate study

Option 2: Registration fees for ongoing education such as; short courses, conferences, seminars, workshops

Option 3: Textbooks related to study **Option 4:** Travel and accommodation

Option 5: Other course related costs may be considered.

The fund is not available for any mandatory training required by an employer which is the employer's responsibility to provide or fund.

Pop Black Memorial Scholarship Fund

Wilfred Eversley "Pop" Black Birth: 24 Apr 1900 Death: 14 July 1983 (aged 83) Burial: Waimate Lawn Cemetery, Canterbury, NZ Wilfred Eversley Black was a retired stock buyer and was familiarly known in the Waimate area throughout his working life as "Pop" Black. In his will he left money "For the Waimate Nurses Home for the use and benefit of the residents therein". At the time of the making of the will and when Pop Black died, the Waimate Nurses Home was used solely for residential purposes for the nursing staff of Waimate Hospital.

When the Waimate Nurses Home closed on 30 September 1996 an application was made to the High Court of New Zealand at Timaru under Part 111 of the Charitable Trusts Act 1957 to approve a scheme on these terms: The Trust was to be known as "the Pop Black Scholarship Fund and was to be held by The New Zealand Nurses Organisation UPON TRUST to apply the net annual income arising therefrom to provide thereout such scholarships in each year as to the number and value of the management committee shall in its absolute discretion recommend to the trustee to assist first year nursing students to e selected by the Management Committee from applicants who have resided for a period of not less than 12 months within the present boundaries of the Waimate District Council by payment of such scholarships towards their fees at a recognised institution for nursing training such students to be known as "Pop Black Scholars".

The Pop Black Memorial Scholarship continues to this day and has the following criteria: Each applicant

- 1. Must be a first-year nursing, midwifery, or other health student
- 2. They must have resided at any one time, in the Waimate district, for a period of at least 12 months
- 3. They must be a financial member of NZNO and remain so until their graduation
- 4. NZNO membership may be exempt for some health-related courses

Thomas Tippet Education Awards Canterbury

Through the generosity of a 1984 bequest from the late Mr. Thomas Tippet (a Canterbury farmer), a number of study awards are available for the education of nurses, and the promotion of health in the Canterbury Region.

The NZNO Canterbury branch was fortunate to be remembered in the will of Thomas Tippet, a single, retired farmer from Canterbury. The 1984 bequest enabled the branch to appoint a full-time secretary and establish an office. The first was on the first floor above Fails Cafe in Cashel Street and branch council members (and their families) painted the rooms and purchased furniture and fittings--a great co-operative effort. Sadly, the building was a victim of the earthquake. The bequest was also used to provide financial support for nursing students and registered nurses for continuing education, research and community health activities.

Nursing Education and Research Foundation

The Nursing Education and Research Foundation (NERF) supports New Zealand nurses, midwives and students of nursing and midwifery with Scholarships and Grants. It was set up in 1968 with philanthropic intent as a registered charitable trust, and is registered with the

The origins of NERF can be traced back to donations placed in a memorial fund established by NZNO to commemorate the life and work of Flora J Cameron OBE (former Director, Division of Nursing) who died in 1966. These donations formed the basis of a permanent fund which would provide New Zealand nurses with travel grants, scholarships and other assistance to enhance opportunities for continuing education, professional development and research.
