Worksite Visits

Over the last three years, to coincide with our annual regional convention, the regional council has invited the President and Kaiwhakahaere of NZNO to accompany council representatives on visits to worksites within the region. On April 11th we visited the Hub in Richmond and met with PHO CEO Angela Francis, Te Piki Oranga Tumuaki General Manager, Anne Hobby, NMDHB Service Manager for Public Health District Nursing & Rural, Peter Burton, CNM District Nurses, Adrienne Whelan, and CNM Primary Health, Anne Maree Ballagh.

Discussions included the future of nursing service provision in the Top of the South and networking between NZNO and stakeholders.

Pre-Convention Dinner

The annual Pre-convention dinner, held on the evening of the 11th April at 623 in the City, included Kaiwhakahaere, Kerri Nuku, President, Grant Brookes, and guest speakers:

- Trina Boyd (ATR Community Liaison Nurse NMDHB) Advance Care planning

This event was well received by participants and professional development certificates were provided to attendees.

Regional Convention

Attendance, at the Regional Convention, held on April 12th, 2016 at Tahuna Conference Centre, was the highest number to date with over 65 participants including guest speakers. Registrations were in excess of 80 but a number were unable to attend due to illness and caregiving needs on the day.

This year the focus was on the primary and community sector. A panel discussion was held on *The Future of Primary and Community Healthcare Delivery in the Top of the South* with speakers: NMDHB CEO, Chris Fleming, NBPHO CEO, Angela Francis, Tumuaki GM Te Piki Oranga, Anne Hobby, and NZNO CEO, Memo Musa.

The panel discussion was facilitated by NZNO President, Grant Brookes, and Kaiwhakahaere, Kerri Nuku. Along with the looming nursing shortage being acknowledged, it was identified that this will also be true for medical practitioners. Planning has begun with stakeholders in the region to determine how best to deliver healthcare services in the future.

The panel discussion, originally scheduled for one hour, extended to two hours as members enjoyed the opportunity to ask questions. Conference attendees appreciated being able to participate in this level of discussion with health care leaders in their region and said the panel discussion was a very positive experience.

In response to feedback from last year, in which members identified they wanted to hear nurses talking about their roles, regional council invited the following speakers to talk about their nursing roles within the community. Guest speakers and topics were:

- Noreen Sargent Specialty Roles in Aged care
- Jo Kara Nursing Business
- Willow Duffy Safeguarding Children

An interactive Health Funding workshop proved to be a hit, with members getting very vocal in their fight to retain their regional services. It brought home the realities of working within an inadequate funding structure as well as the need to create public awareness and to be politically savvy.

A powerpoint presentation was delivered to inform members of the role of the Membership Committee and the work currently being undertaken.

Feedback from convention participants has been positive. Concerns were raised regarding noise, as this site is on the flight path for Nelson Airport and although intermittent it did impact on delivery of some sessions. Currently, due to the advantages that this venue provides; e.g. the versatility of room spaces, excellent catering, and the advantage of free parking, the Council does not envisage any change in venue at this point.
