Nurse Prescribing

On your behalf the Committee asked Nursing Council if vildagliptin could be added to the prescribing list at least while we are at level 4 Covid-19 alert to help simplify care.

Nursing Council has advised us that this will not be happening but suggested if additional prescribing medications would be useful you could consider asking the doctor you normally work with for a standing order.

Covid-19

The **NZSSD** website https://www.nzssd.org.nz/ has a lot of good information about COVID-19 and diabetes. People with diabetes which is not that well managed who get COVIDare more at risk of serious complications so we have to continue our efforts to help them get their blood glucose down. NZSSD have provided clarity about the use of ACE-I and ARB in patients with COVID-19 following questions being raised about their use. They will also be putting up information for people about moving out of level 4.


Many of you will have been helping anxious patients. The NZSSD website has resources developed by Jo McLintock, psychologist from Waikato for adults and children.

Nursing Council has said that nurses currently selected for audit will instead receive automatic recertification this time.



Accreditation Update

October 2019 round:

Congratulations to Bryan Gibbison, Lyn McPherson, Ashley Gage and a large contingent from Wellington -Heather Campbell, Gilli Lewis, Christine Curry, Lindsay McTavish, and Val Crawford who were accredited in the October round.

May 2020 round:

Four applications were received for this round and they are currently being assessed.

New process:

The new accreditation process is now available and was used by two of the most recent applicants. The changes include the removal of requiring a PDRP, improved layout of forms, and the addition of the assessors' tool to the accreditation handbook. The changes have led to reduced application fees.

Funding Support:

Remember that ACDN has a grants fund that may be used to help cover some of the costs of accreditation or for assessor training. Details of the fund and how to apply are on the ACDN website.

Confidentiality:

There are still breaches of both patient and colleague confidentiality in the accreditation applications. Examples unconsented include photos, using vivid or twink to partially block out patient identifiers that remain visible, including patient email addresses, and listing colleague's names without consent. confidentiality Maintaining colleagues and patient/clients is legislatively required and breaches mean the portfolio will not be assessed.

NZNO have updated their practice guideline titled **Privacy**, **Confidentiality and Consent in the Use of Exemplars of Practice**, **Case Studies and** Journaling, 2016.
