Kia Ora

The National Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO Committee and I send our warmest regards to you all, and hope you are all looking after yourselves, as we all cope with not only a nursing shortage in New Zealand, but Covid-19 still making its impact across New Zealand.

The Nursing Council of New Zealand (NCNZ) announced the review of the Enrolled Nurse Scope of Practice on International Nurses Day, 12th May 2022.

The National Enrolled Nurse Section Committee began discussions with the NCNZ, in August 2020, in regard to that it was timely to review our current Enrolled Nurse Scope of Practice, which was implemented in 2010 with the 18-month Diploma in Enrolled Nursing to replace the then limited Enrolled Nurse Programme in aged care and rehabilitation.

We initially asked them that we wanted the “under direction and delegation of a Registered Nurse and Nurse Practitioner” changed to

“Working in collaboration and partnership with the Registered Nurse and Nurse Practitioner” as that is how most enrolled nurses practice now in New Zealand.

They in turn suggested it may result in a full review of the enrolled nurse scope of practice.

Along with the EN Scope of practice review we discussed a shorter pathway for Enrolled Nurse to Registered Nurse.

The committee have been meeting regularly with the NCNZ, continuing to discuss this. Then in April 2022 we met with them again and they informed us in confidence that the review would commence earlier than the suggested date of 2023.

So, on International Nurses Day we were absolutely delighted to receive this fantastic news as per below, that the review will commence this year.

"The Council has agreed to review the Scope of Practice for Enrolled Nurses. We are pleased to be developing this Review in collaboration with the Enrolled Nurse section of the New Zealand Nurses Organisation.

This Review is currently in the planning stages, and we anticipate beginning it within the next few months. The Review will proceed in two stages; the first will involve revisiting the Scope statement to ensure it fully represents the current nature and future potential of Enrolled Nurse practice. The second stage will involve looking at the competencies which underpin the Scope, and the education standards that support education in the area. Further information, including how we will engage with and

seek input from the profession, will be available as the Review progresses."

In November 2021 the Nursing Council of New Zealand asked the National Enrolled Nurse Section Committee to put together a reference group to begin looking at the scope. We invited enrolled nurses, some educators in the current NZ Diploma in Enrolled Nursing, a Nurse Manager from aged care, who fully understands the enrolled nurse scope and role, and forwarded this to the Nursing Council for their decision on who would be on the reference group.

ENROLLED NURSES AS PROVISIONAL VACCINATORS TO AUTHORISED VACCINATOR

108 enrolled nurses throughout New Zealand are Provisional Authorised Vaccinators and are eligible to achieve the full scope of practice as an Authorised Vaccinator to administer vaccines on the National Immunisation Schedule (NIS), across the life span.

To complete this course, you must be a Provisional Authorised Vaccinator (provisional authorisation is issued by the Ministry of Health and is valid for two years since issue date). Upon completing the education course, you will need to meet all the requirements outlined in Appendix 4 of the Immunisation Handbook to either apply for authorisation or become a pharmacist vaccinator (more details in Authorisation section below).

This course involves online learning (10-12 hours), followed by a three hour in-person tutorial. The bridging course will be available from 31 May 2022 at

NEW ENROLLED NURSE SECTION CHAIRPERSON:

Nominations were called for the new Chairperson and two nominations were received, which went out for voting by all members of the Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO.

The new Chairperson will be announced at our online Annual General Meeting on the 1st of June 2022

NATIONAL COMMITTEE NOMINATIONS:

We also sent a call for committee nominations earlier; one nomination was received in from a standing committee member who was eligible to be on the National Committee for a further two years. We still have two vacancies, and the call for nominations will go out soon.

The Chairperson in your region must sign the nomination form. Currently out of 11 regional enrolled nurse sections, we only have 8 who are active. Therefore, nominations can only be received from Regional Enrolled Nurse Sections that are active.

Ideally, you should have some experience of being on a Regional Enrolled Nurse Section Committee.

ENROLLED NURSE SECTION NZNO ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – 1ST JUNE 2022 AT 7PM.

Due to the postponement of the 2022 Annual Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO Conference, our Annual General Meeting (AGM) will be an on-line event at 7pm on the 1st of June 2022.

We would like as many of our Enrolled Nurse Section Members to attend this. If we do not get a quorum, we will have to change it to a report back meeting only.

The zoom link for the Annual General Meeting will be sent to all our Enrolled Nurse Section Members soon, along with a link to the 2021 AGM minutes, and two discussion papers. These are the Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO - Generic Enrolled Nurse Position Description, which the National Committee updated in April 2022. This will be further updated following the introduction and implementation of the new Enrolled Nurse Scope of Practice. The second discussion paper is the paper regarding investigating to become a College of NZNO. This was discussed at the 2021 Annual General Meeting in Dunedin. A few questions were asked of the National Committee re including the statement in the NZNO Constitution about NZNO Colleges and Regional Enrolled Nurse Section funds. These have been added to the document. The National Committee is recommending that this paper be held over until the review of the NZNO Constitution is completed, which will not be in 2022.

PAY EQUITY

Enrolled Nurses in the DHB's had a significant gain in the combined NZNO/ PSA Pay Equity claim, also gaining an extra step of Step 5. But as I write this NZNO is taking our claim to the Employment Relations Authority due to the government backing down

on back pay to 31st December 2019 for those who are NZNO members.

The National Committee would like to see Pay Equity claims, expanded into all health care settings in New Zealand to acknowledge not only the work that all regulated nurses do on a daily basis, but the inequity of all women in New Zealand being underpaid for many many years, compared to males.

Te Kaunihera Tapuhi o Aotearoa | The Nursing Council of New Zealand is seeking expressions of interest from suitably qualified Enrolled Nurses who are keen to share their expertise with us as we contemporise the nursing state final examination.

The Council has been working to contemporise the state final examination for Registered Nurses and Enrolled Nurses. A key aspect of this work is to ensure quality questions – which is where we need input from Enrolled Nurses. This work involves reviewing the multi-choice questions used in the state final examination.

The Nursing Council is seeking expressions of interest from interested enrolled nurses who have at least three years or more experience.

This is a great opportunity for enrolled nurses who are interested. Further details are below.

MARANGA MAI RISE UP EVERY NURSE EVERY WHERE

NZNO's safe staffing campaign was launched on International Nurses Day and will go hard. There will be no strike action, as strike action is only for MECA negotiations. There will be various campaigns run and every NZNO member in New Zealand should

get involved in one way or another. We all need to **Join Together** to win the political and resourcing commitments needed to address the nursing shortage crisis permanently and across the whole health sector. Please get involved.

PRIMARY HEALTH CARE – MENTAL HEALTH & ADDICTIONS:

In 2019, the government allocated 9.2 million for 40 Enrolled Nurse and 14 Nurse Practitioner positions in the area of Mental Health and Addictions. In late 2020, Dr Sue Adams, from Auckland University commenced gathering groups of interested parties and contacted the Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO, of whom are a partner in this project.

This project is going well, with two enrolled nurses employed in the South Island in the areas of mental health and addictions.

Northland is doing very well in this area from Kaitaia to Whangarei. 8 plus qualified enrolled nurses or enrolled nurse students, via an apprenticeship model are being employed or supported via the funding provided by the government, in various medical centres and other facilities across Northland. Some medical centres are employing 2 enrolled nurses, some have taken on student enrolled nurses, in an apprenticeship model – commencing the New Zealand Diploma in Enrolled Nursing at NorthTec and working back in the medical centre in the holidays, alongside Registered Nurses. An iwi provider has also taken on 2 enrolled nurse students, in the apprenticeship model. Majority of enrolled nurses or students identify as Maori. A large South Auckland Kaupapa Māori health

provider and Hokianga Health are employing an enrolled nurse and both facilities may employ more enrolled nurses.

THE VOLUNTARY BONDING SCHEME

The Voluntary Bonding Scheme (the Scheme) is a practical initiative run by the Ministry of Health to encourage newly qualified health professionals to work in the communities and specialties that need them most, and to retain essential health professionals in New Zealand. It also aims to increase representation of Māori and Pacific peoples within the health workforce.

The Scheme is targeted to new or recent graduates in eligible professions who are starting their career, with the aim of incentivising them to work in eligible hard-to-staff communities or specialties. Those accepted to the Scheme can become eligible for payments in the first three-to-five years of their career, to help repay their student loan or as top-up income.

In the 2021 Intake – 20 Enrolled Nurses were approved for voluntary bonding

Enrolled Nurses who work in the following specialities can apply for Voluntary Bonding:

Aged Care (aged residential care and older persons' health services)

Mental Health (hospital and community, including addiction services)

FEES FREE

Is available for Enrolled Nurse students until December 2022, at all

Polytechnics in New Zealand, under the Targeted Training & Apprenticeship Fund (TTAF). Fee Free is targeted at first-time learners. You may be able to get one year's study or two years' training fees free.

We are hoping that it will be extended beyond 2022.

REGIONAL ENROLLED NURSE SECTION STUDY DAYS:

We are hoping that our regional enrolled nurse sections can go ahead with their study days later this year. They all organise and host great study days and usually a certificate is given for attending. They will be advertised via this newsletter, our website and on our face book page.

NATIONAL ENROLLED NURSE DAY 30TH JUNE 2022

Let us all celebrate National Enrolled Nurse Day on the 30th of June 2022, and celebrate that our Enrolled Nurse Scope of Practice review is commencing in 2022.

NATIONAL ENROLLED NURSE SECTION OUTGOING COMMITTEE MEMBERS:

A huge thank you to Debbie Handisides, from Canterbury, who has completed her four-year term, as a valuable National Enrolled Nurse Section Committee member. Debbie has been our Action Plan scribe, Vice-Chairperson, and our Regional Enrolled Nurse Section Liaison officer. We know that Debbie will continue supporting Enrolled Nurses and the Enrolled Nurse Section via her involvement with the Canterbury Regional Enrolled Nurse Section and as a NZNO Delegate.

A huge thank you to Charmaine Parker, National Secretary, Enrolled Nurse Section. Chairperson & Secretary of the Tai Tokerau/Northland Regional Enrolled Nurse Section, who has been on the National Committee for two years. Due to work commitments and further study Charmaine has decided to step down. A lot has been achieved for the profession of Enrolled Nursing, the recommencement of the Enrolled Nurse programme, the review and new enrolled nurse scope of practice, with the commencement of the

Diploma in Enrolled Nursing and title then changed to the New Zealand Diploma in Enrolled Nursing. Enrolled Nurses are provisional vaccinators and can now apply to be Authorised Vaccinators from the 31st of May 2022, Enrolled Nurses are being employed in mental health and addictions in primary health care; Enrolled Nurses who work at Burwood Hospital, can care for intubated patients, alongside a registered nurse, Enrolled Nurses are providing home haemodialysis in the community in Otago and Southland, the list is endless. Eight polytechnics are offering the Enrolled Nurse programme, with some have two intakes per year of February and July.

This is my last newsletter as Chairperson of the Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO National Committee.

As you may already know, the Council has been working to contemporise the state final examination for Registered Nurses and Enrolled Nurses. A key aspect of this work is to ensure quality

questions – which is where we need input from Enrolled Nurses. This work involves reviewing the multi-choice questions used in the state final examination. To be part of this exciting, paid opportunity reviewing the multi-choice questions, you will need to meet the following criteria:

- *Understand the fundamental knowledge required for a newly registered Enrolled Nurse to practise safely*
- *Have current experience working with new graduate Enrolled Nurses and/or Enrolled Nurse students*
- *Be in good standing with the Nursing Council*
- *Have at least three years post-registration experience*
- *Have excellent critical thinking skills*
- *Be open and willing to learn and debate how to create 'good' exam questions within a group*
- *Be available/flexible to attend subject matter expert workshops in Wellington (typically two days in duration) from early August. Please note the Council would fund any travel and accommodation required. We anticipate two 2-day workshops in 2022 with some ongoing workshops in subsequent years.*

*We are looking for a small number of people who come from a broad range of clinical backgrounds (such as acute, aged care, mental health and addiction, community and other). To apply, please submit a copy of your CV to **Kaye Milligan** at: kaye@nursingcouncil.org.nz along with an email outlining why you are keen to be part of this mahi / work and the clinical area you feel most comfortable contributing to. Please ensure you include the names and*

contact details of two referees in your application or on your CV (one should be your current nursing leader/manager).

Successful candidates will be advised in writing and will be provided with relevant contract information.

Some background details are that this project has two key parts: digitisation of the exam to move it from being on paper to fully online, AND implementation of a quality improvement framework that ensures the exam questions remain contemporary and relevant in an ever-changing healthcare environment. In terms of digitising the exam, we anticipate that all examinations will be completely online by November 2022.

What ENSIPP provided and taught me was how to improve my rapid assessment skills and implement them into my practice. ENSIPP provided me with an opportunity to enrol in the Health Assessment of Older Persons Health, postgraduate course at ARA. Snippets from the Regions

Greater Auckland

Waitemata DHB

Business as usual, with continued preparation for the rise of Covid cases. Currently nursing staff are preparing to be deployed from clinics to help on the wards when the need arises, this in turn has created positions for enrolled nurses on bureau as well as in the theatres.

Counties Manukau DHB (CMDHB)

There are currently more job opportunities for enrolled nurses (EN) at CMDHB. EN students have been welcomed and Dorothy, (Auckland EN Section Committee member) commented on the calibre of the DEN (Diploma of Enrolled Nurse) students in her workplace, their assessment and communication skills and patient cares were all of a high standard. Dorothy was also able to do a tutorial for them on safe patient handling. Dorothy received a reply email from Val Scott, Lecturer/NZ Diploma Enrolled Nursing at Manukau Institute of Technology (MIT) and already they are faced with challenges with clinical placements for enrolled nursing students and the delivery of teaching sessions due to Covid but simply have to go with the flow in the current climate and hopefully the impact will be manageable.

Currently MIT are taking two cohorts of DEN students yearly, with a total of three cohorts running due to the cross over times. Numbers of intakes range from 50-80 students, so as you can imagine it's a busy department. Nursing Council (NCNZ) are soon to review the DEN programme at MIT and there has been some talk nationally about making some tweaks to the DEN programme, which may allow for more flexibility around the

clinical hours with the thought that it may be possible to add in a transition placement. Val will keep us updated on the outcome.

Auckland DHB

In my correspondence with Hayden Erick, Nurse Educator, Enrolled nursing and student placement here at ADHB, he stated that currently there are seven enrolled nurses on the ENSIPP from the November 2021 intake, 3 are working in ophthalmology, one in oncology, 2 in older people health and 1 in Women's theatre and that they are all doing really well 3 months in. Hayden said there is a small intake mid-March and interviewing is happening now. However, the numbers coming through ACE are minimal and that there are jobs with no candidates interviewing, there were only 2 EN's in the ACE pool that lived in the Auckland region. He also mentioned that they do recruitment drives with the classes and continue to offer more and more placements to students, but only in the 2nd semester. He was encouraging in his comments that it is great to hear the ENSIPP is doing well and that the EN profile is building. EN's on the ENSIPP are asking about a bridging program from the diploma to RN degree. In my workplace, our two new graduate enrolled nurses continue to move forward in their practice and I have been busy writing up their professional development feedback and continue to provide hands on teaching. We have also had DEN student placements and I have had the pleasure, like Dorothy to precept these students and the calibre has been definitely of a high standard. I was however surprised that even though they were in their second semester, that they were not aware of the ACE programme. I have been busy with giving preceptor feedback to the students but I have to say its just another day at the office and a pleasure to be actually doing these

and to see student enrolled nurses out and about at ADHB. Primary Health (PHC) One of our committee members works with a team of RN's and 3 other EN's in PHC, where she feels appreciated in her role as an EN and completed the online requirement for provisional vaccinating Covid, which this year stopped in her workplace and changed to standing orders with ProCare which means if she wanted to move to another non ProCare medical practice she wouldn't be able to vaccinate. Student nurses come through this area too and buddy with EN's and RN's in different clinics but RN's sign them off.

Canterbury

Southern

Education in Region

Otago Polytechnic and Southland Polytechnic NZ Diploma in Enrolled

Nursing programmes commenced in February 2022, with 30 at Otago and 25 in Southland. I have been invited as the Chairperson for Southern to present to the EN Students at Southland Institute of Technology in June 2022. The NZNO professional nursing advisor is also going to attend and present on code of conduct and professional boundaries.

News

NICU at Dunedin Hospital are currently investigating employing enrolled nurses within NICU. I attended a meeting with the NICU's local data council on the 14th February 2021 to discuss the enrolled nurse scope of practice. The CNM asked if the Enrolled Nurse Section had a generic enrolled nurse scope of practice document. NICU received a lot of extra FTEs out of their trend care data, in December 2021. NICU can be very busy, with babies from Otago and Southland and sometimes they are full with babies from other DHB's and none locally. Southland Hospital has a NICU, but at a lower grade to Dunedin Hospital's, so some of their babies are airlifted to Dunedin. Have suggested that perhaps they should contact Otago Polytechnic in regards to having an Enrolled Nurse student on clinical placements in the future. Enrolled Nurses at SDHB, may be a step closer to doing IVAB's, as I bought it up with the Director of Nursing, who attended the NICU meeting. EN's are being left behind, with the DHB's HCA's getting more recognition and education than the Enrolled Nurse. I am personally monitoring what the HCA are being educated on. Enrolled Nurse Positions being advertised throughout the region have increased significantly. This has enabled some Enrolled Nurses to change their areas of practice, something that did not occur years ago. Enrolled Nurse Positions have been advertised at the private surgical hospital, Mercy Hospital, in a new overnight stay ward; Ashburn
