Enrolled Nurses, who are we? Caring, experienced, resilient, patient, vibrant, energetic, positive, uplifting, knowledgeable, a fantastic group of wonderful Nurses caring for our Northland clients and bringing so much to the overall Nursing Team.

I am proud to be an Enrolled Nurse. So much has changed since I trained at the Northland Hospital in 1983 and 1984. We have endured the changes from a significant EN workforce, to then be replaced with a significant RN workforce. Now our position is challenged by the introduction of HCAs and Support Workers, or EN positions are replaced with RNs. We are a threatened workforce, and our roles are frequently misunderstood.

Last year we met with the DON Margareth Broodkorn to discuss NDHB's support for the return of Enrolled Nursing students, and this was well supported. The outcome of this meeting was to investigate a new polytechnic Enrolled Nurse training programme, and Margareth was keen to support Enrolled Nursing students at the NDHB.

This year we will investigate the options for possible training facilities, and also have further discussions with the new DON, to see if this plan would be supported by the new DON. We need more ENs trained, and we also need more EN positions being advertised.

Obviously it would be good if existing EN positions were replaced, and not eliminated entirely for an HCA or RN as this seems to be what currently happens.

We feel that an Enrolled Nurse brings so much more to the overall Nursing Team: a "New Scope of Enrolled Nursing" means we can offer more skills than previously, and our cost to the Ministry of Health is less than a Registered Nurse. Watch this space; we'd love to announce the reintroduction of EN training in Northland.

On the 16th Nov'18, we held our bi-yearly Study Day in Whangarei, "Enlightening Enrolled Nurses", and this was very well attended by 37 ENs.

Education in Region

Our annual study day was held on 29th October 2018 at the Ko Awatea Lecture Theatre CMH

In total 55 enrolled nurses attended plus the committee.

The Auckland Section is currently in the process of planning our annual study day, which is to be held on 21st October 2019 at the Ko Awatea Lecture Theatre CMH.

The Auckland Section was able to partly fund 4 section members to attend conference in 2018.

Waitamata District Health Board (WDHB)

Advertised positions for enrolled nurses continue when vacancies arise, and those that have been employed are moving up their levels with no issues.

Auckland District Health Board (ADHB)

ADHB continued to take enrolled nurse student placements from MIT in 2018.

AHDB Director of Nursing Margaret Dotchin stated that she sees this as a great way for ENs to get to know our organisation. She went on to comment that there are no barriers to enrolled nurses getting employment at ADHB other than Charge Nurses looking at their skill mix and including the role within their ward or department as appropriate.

In relation to the ENs in ED a summary of the evaluation and next steps is outlined below:

In September 2017 two new graduate ENs were employed into the nursing team in the Adult

Emergency Department (AED) with the aim of beginning to change the nursing model of care and delivery through provision of a different skill mix. One of these new ENs had been employed as a HCA in the Emergency Department prior to their employment at the EN scope.

Key findings from evaluation of ENs in ED include:

- Understanding and use of direction and delegation by registered nurses (RN) was not universally understood and applied to maximise enrolled nurse (EN) practice.
- A cautious approach to utilisation of the full range of beginning skills and capabilities of the EN's was taken.
- The EN's felt they could contribute more to patient care.
- The EN's were taught new skills that extended their capabilities.
- A clinical workload sharing period of up to 6 weeks is recommended, particularly for EN graduates with no prior health worker experience.

It was therefore recommended new graduate enrolled nurses should ideally be growing in their skills and competence over a three year period, which takes account of the various team models, patient populations and clinical risks in the Level 2 environment. The following advice responds to this complexity.

Some key planned improvements to the EN transition in Level 2 services include:

- Increasing the orientation and clinical workload-sharing period from 3-6 weeks with ability to shorten or extend the orientation dependent on the skill and confidence of individual ENs.
- Ensuring a trained preceptor is provided to the new EN who is responsible for supporting the EN for 6 months on their transition to practice programme.
- Ensuring the Level 2 nursing staff are trained in direction & delegation
- Specifying a list of nursing skills and interventions appropriate to the EN during the transition to practice year
- Focussing first year of practice with more stable/predictable patient populations in the Level 2 environment
- Developing and implementing a communication plan to improve understanding of the developing EN scope
- Specifying the list of skills and nursing intervention in or out of EN scope for year 2 and year 3-post graduate.

Counties Manukau Health (CMH)

Enrolled nurse positions continue to be advertised at CMH on a regular basis and successful applicants attend the welcome/orientation with registered nurses. Recently, EN's positions have been advertised in acute orthopaedic and Kids First.

The Department of Corrections Auckland Prison

The latest update from Kirsten Harrison, Health Centre Manager, at Auckland Prison stated that they still have 7 enrolled nurses at the Mt Eden Corrections Facility and 3 at Auckland Prison. There is ongoing professional development for the nurses into different areas of the health service, therefore extending their scope of practice. Kirsten went on to comment that Health

Mangers only have positive feedback on the inclusion of the enrolled nurses into their health service with recent advertising for enrolled nurses with a fix 2- year term.

Manukau Institute of Technology (MIT)

Dorothy Browning, Auckland Section secretary was again invited in February by MIT tutors to discuss with student enrolled nurses her role as an enrolled nurse and how she practices within her scope of practice.

At the NZ Diploma in Enrolled Nursing graduation ceremony, which was held in March, **Iliafi Simone** was also presented with the National Enrolled Nurse Section **Excellence award.** Throughout the NZ Diploma programme, Iliafi consistently demonstrated an overall high standard of knowledge in theory and clinical practice. Congratulations Iliafi.

To date there has been no reply to an email sent to MIT for a current update.

<u>News</u>

This year sadly our section has seen the passing of two of our members.

Sheila Street, who presented at the Auckland Section Conference in 2017, on diversity in theatre as an Enrolled Nurse working at WDHB. Sheila had previously presented at one of our study days and at conference about her work experience on the Mercy Ships as a volunteer, a role she was incredibly passionate about.

Debbie Maote passed suddenly while kayaking in the Hauraki Gulf. Debbie worked at ADHB as an enrolled nurse in OPH for more than 15 years.

They will both be greatly missed by their family, friends and colleagues. RIP Sheila and Debbie we thank you both for your commitment to enrolled nursing during the course of your careers.

In closing, thank you Midlands Section for hosting the 41st Enrolled Nurse Section Conference. A tremendous amount of planning goes into organising a conference and it is purely voluntary, an act of sacrifice of one's time, along with the mix of family and work balances. Thank you for this commitment over the past year.

Education in Region

Midlands Regional Enrolled Nurse Section are very proud to be hosting the 41st Annual Enrolled Nurse Section conference at Wintec in Hamilton.

Waikato DHB is holding their annual study day for enrolled nurses within the Midlands region on 30th September 2019 and are currently working on what is looking like a great programme. Enrolled nurses in Midlands region continue to be encouraged to access education on Ko Awatea e learning.

<u>Current Issues in Region</u>

Low numbers attending meetings, we decided to only have an AGM and meetings in August and December this year and will continue to send out relevant information and updates via email to our regional membership. It is increasingly frustrating and difficult to think of strategies on how to attract new members to our regional section. I know this is also a national issue. With the newly employed enrolled nurses at Waikato DHB, who are mostly new graduates, in some areas there continues to be a lack of understanding of the enrolled nurse scope of practice hence presenting some barriers in areas of clinical practice. We need to continue to educate our colleagues on the value of the enrolled nurse workforce when they are utilised to their full potential. There has also been feedback from Health Care Assistants that they feel that enrolled nurses are now "taking their jobs" as there have been cohorts of enrolled nurses being employed in some areas. I think we need to be mindful of this and support all groups of health workers as we certainly don't want a fragmented health workforce.

<u>News</u>

It is great to see continuing employment of enrolled nurses within the Midlands region including in the private sector and an enrolled nurse position with one of our iwi provider groups. 18 enrolled nurses graduated with their New Zealand Diploma in Enrolled Nursing from Wintec on March 20th, National Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO awards for the Enrolled Nurse 'Demonstrating Leadership Skills' and Midlands Regional Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO award for 'Best Student in Clinical Placement' were presented at the Special Awards Evening. This is a proud time to support our graduating enrolled nurses and future enrolled nurse workforce and a great opportunity to acknowledge their wonderful achievements. The intake of enrolled nurse students at Wintec has increased over the last year and there has been a significant increase in Maori and Pacifica students.....and the students are now in the younger age bracket!!!

The peer support group meetings continue for the newly qualified enrolled nurses who have been employed at Waikato DHB and these group meeting are held monthly for their first 12

months of employment as part of their orientation programme. Certainly a great and safe forum to discuss any concerns. A few issues have presented and have been addressed. Waikato DHB newly employed enrolled nurses are certainly enthusiastic and embracing their new learning opportunities with some of them now cannulating patients and taking bloods. This is certainly great progress.

Education in Region

Otago Polytechnic have 20-22 in their current NZ Diploma in Enrolled Nursing which commenced in February 2019. I met with the new students in March at the polytechnic. An enthusiastic bunch of people who want to be enrolled nurses. This class includes one male.

Southland Institute of Technology have 16 in their current NZ Diploma in Enrolled Nursing which commenced October 2018. 18 students sat the state exam in March 2019 and will graduate in December 2019. 14 of 18 students who graduated in December 2018 have employment and 2 are currently not seeking work as on maternity leave.

The Southern Region Enrolled Nurse Section presented two awards to graduating enrolled nurses from Otago and Southland Polytechnics, in December 2018.

Zaley Tamihana-Brown, who works on a general surgical ward at Dunedin Hospital was the recipient of the Southern Region Enrolled Nurse Section Award "Best Overall Student", New Zealand Diploma in Enrolled Nursing at Otago Polytechnic

The recipient of the Southern Region Enrolled Nurse Section Award for "Contribution in an Acute Environment", New Zealand Diploma in Enrolled Nursing, was Jessica Popham from the Southland Institute of Technology.

We also hold our Annual General Meeting at the study day and currently have 13 committee members, 4 of whom are new enrolled nurses.

Current Issues in Region

Waitaki District Health Services (WDHS), Oamaru Hospital released a proposed restructure document in February 2019 for all staff employed at Oamaru Hospital. The proposal included disestablishing most of the enrolled nurse positions (16), leaving a 0.5FTE on district nursing and 1.0 FTE in the inpatient ward. I travelled to Oamaru to meet with the enrolled nurses and following this did a submission, as National Chairperson, with input from the enrolled nurses. In the submission we put forward a suggested staff mix, which included enrolled nurses on all shifts and suggested retaining the current enrolled nurse positions on district and even increasing their hours. This was a very stressful time for not only the enrolled nurses but for all the staff at Oamaru Hospital. Quite a few registered nurses left and the hospital is now short staffed. The Maternity Unit was not included in the restructure. The restructure decision on the 8th April has retained all the enrolled nurse positions, but other positions that were identified in the document to go, have not been reinstated.

The Oamaru Maternity Unit is now understaffed and in April was unable to accept mums and babes coming back from Queen Mary, in Dunedin. Enrolled Nurses work in this unit.

News

National Enrolled Nurse Day was celebrated in the Southern Region with displays in the foyers of Dunedin Hospital and Invercargill Hospital. Photos of enrolled nurses were taken around the two hospitals and appeared on the SDHB Face Book page, wishing enrolled nurses are happy "National Enrolled Nurse Day".

Our annual Southern Region Enrolled Nurse Section Study Day will be in Invercargill in October 2019 at Invercargill Hospital. Programme and presenters being organised currently.

Enrolled Nurse Positions continue to be advertised across the Southern DHB, sometimes there are 4-5 vacancies. These vacancies are either enrolled nurses retiring or newly created enrolled nurse positions. Enrolled nurse positions have increased in the private sector, with some aged care facilities advertising and employing enrolled nurses for the first time ever. Emails are sent out to all the enrolled nurses who are members of the southern region enrolled nurse section.

Membership:

We continue to loose members as our long time members of the section retire from nursing. Recently losing two that I am aware of and another one in the near future. The NZNO student free membership for a year is great and we do get new enrolled nurses members from that, but when it expires, it appears, they discontinue their membership for the next 6 months, and we lose them off the enrolled nurse membership.
