

Chairperson's news

Welcome to the first Enrolled Nurse Section newsletter for 2016. Goodbye to our long summer days as Autumn approaches. We look forward to another busy, productive and exciting year for enrolled nursing in 2016.

Planning is well underway for the 38th Annual Enrolled Nurse Section Conference being hosted by Top of the South Regional Enrolled Nurse Section in Blenheim 28th-30th June 2016. Debbie Hawkey and the conference organizing committee have certainly put together a great programme and we encourage Enrolled Nurse participation in the Fnrolled Nurse Section AGM conference discussion, debate, and networking. At conference three enrolled nurses will be presenting abstracts the conference to delegates.

The February Enrolled Nurse Section committee meeting was very productive with invited guests Lesley Harry (NZNO Industrial Advisor), Carolyn Reed and Maureen Kelly (Nursing Council of New Zealand) and Jane Bodkin (Senior Advisor-Nursing, Office of the Chief Nurse).

Lesley attended our meeting in response to concerns from Enrolled Nurse Section membership following ratification of the DHB MECA in 2015. Issues had been raised re lack of acknowledgement of Enrolled Nurse PDRP achievements and the increasing pay gap between RN and EN and the closing pay rates between EN and HCA. Enrolled nurses will certainly continue with information gathering and are encouraged to continue to lobby their case in their workplaces in readiness for the DHB MECA negotiations in 2017.

Carolyn and Maureen presented very interesting data on the Enrolled Nurse workforce in New Zealand. Statistics show enrolled nurse's work in employment settings across the whole health spectrum and don't appear to be restricted to practice areas. The Enrolled Nurse Section also plans to look at statistics for enrolled nurse graduates. the numbers gaining employment as enrolled nurses, their employment settings and practice areas and orientation programs available.

Jane gave an update of the meeting held with Health Workforce New Zealand (HWNZ) and attended by Chairperson and Treasurer of Enrolled Nurse Section, Memo Musa and Suzanne Rolls. We discussed the key issues for the Enrolled Nurse Section in 2016 including continuing to work with HWNZ to ensure enrolled nursing is part of the workforce plan, progress the need for a supported enrolled nurse entry to practice programme, continue to raise the profile of enrolled nurses and to showcase their areas of clinical practice and achievements in a variety of forums. A discussion was held with Jane about the role of enrolled nurses in the use of Inter Rai assessment tool. While there are no barriers enabling enrolled nurse being trained in the use of this tool it may be problematic due to the funding being channeled into training of registered nurses.

I would like to congratulate some of our Enrolled Nurse Champions. To the Enrolled Nurses working with Dialysis patients in the Dunedin region, thanks for sharing your story in the February issue of Kai Tiaki. Pãnui issue 3

Debbie Palmer (Midlands Enrolled Nurse Section) and Robyn Schelaak (Southern Enrolled Nurse Section) congratulations on being selected as Enrolled Nurse representatives on an expert group working with MOH, ACC, HQSC and sector stakeholders to help reach consensus on best practice guidelines on the prevention of pressure injuries in hospitals, aged residential care and home care. To our Enrolled Nurse graduates and to those who have been recipients of the Enrolled Nurse Section NZNO 'Demonstrating awards for Leadership Skills' and to the enrolled nurse graduates who have been recipients of Regional Enrolled Nurse Section awards, congratulations and we wish you well in your exciting future in enrolled nursing. It is certainly heartening to see more employment of our enrolled nurse graduates and further employment opportunities for our existing enrolled nurse workforce. We are making progress but still a long way to go to gain more recognition of the role and value of the enrolled nurse in the New Zealand health system.

To the Regional Enrolled Nurse Sections, the National Enrolled Nurse Section Committee and Suzanne Rolls, NZNO Professional Nursing Advisor thanks for ensuring we continue to be a strong voice for enrolled nursing.

Northland/Tai Tokerau

No new issues in the region, same ongoing ones. A study day is planned for later in the year.

Auckland

Angela and Dorothy attended the medal pinning ceremony at MIT to present pens and scrolls to newly graduated enrolled nurses. They also presented the Enrolled Nurse Section award to the Enrolled Nurse who had demonstrated leadership skills (selected by MIT tutors). CMDHB has this year asked the MIT tutors to put forward 10 names of whom they would recommend for employment at the completion of the training programme. There have been several advertised employment opportunities for enrolled nurses in the Auckland region.

BOP/Tairawhiti

The next study day is still to be finalised. There are still concerns around the Enrolled Nurses who work at Althorp Rest Home, which has been sold. All staff had to reapply for their jobs and were reemployed on lesser rates. NZNO is working with members at Althorp. Excitement is building around the 2016 conference.

Hawkes Bay

No meeting as yet. We are trying different venues/times/days this year, hopefully to encourage a larger attendance. We are having a couple of café meetings (very informal). The HBDHB still isn't employing EN's but we are working on this.

Greater Wellington

Enrolled Nurse Statistics from Nursing Council of **New Zealand**

At 31 March 2015, the total Enrolled Nurse workforce was 2726, down from 3156 in 2011. The average hours worked is 32 hours per week.

The following is the age, number of and percentage of the EN workforce

20s	175	(6.4%)
30s	123	(4.5%)
40s	281	(10.3%)
50s	1293	(47.4%)
60s	619	(22.7%)
65-70	235	(8.6%)

As you can see, the greatest percentage of the Enrolled Nurse workforce is in the 50-60 years age group. (This is why we need to encourage the younger EN's to be involved with the regional EN Sections).

The EN workforce has a higher proportion of women than the RN workforce, with only 4% of EN's being male. The EN workforce is also older than the RN workforce, with 11% aged under 40 and 79% 50 or above.

The mean age of female EN's was 54, with the mean age of male EN's 46.

The region with the largest percentage of the EN workforce was Canterbury, where 20% of EN's worked, followed by Auckland with 17%. The smallest regional workforce was in the Tairawhiti region with just over 1% of all EN's.
