done within their professions and thought I would share my journey too. I trained as an Enrolled Nurse at Rotorua Hospital and registered in 1979, continuing to work there in the medical and surgical wards. They were great years working in a team where we all knew and respected each other's scope of practice and worked well together under the direction of the watchful eye of the Ward Matron!

I moved on to Auckland's Greenlane Hospital and had many informative years working in Children's Cardiology.

Saving for the big OE I moved home, free rent, and secured a job at Waikato Hospital working in a very busy and understaffed Medical Unit. I decided then to change direction and spent a couple of years training as a Pharmacists Assistant and working in this role. A challenging job counting out tablets and deciphering doctor's handwriting!

Next came the big OE and my nursing experience during that time only in Phlebotomy.

Following this a large gap form nursing marrying and raising a family. As my registration had lapsed I reregistered in 1990.

I work within my scope of practice under the direction and supervision of a great team of RN's and Doctors. My job description is interesting and varied and evolving all the time as my peers learn more about the EN scope of practice. We have RN students here on 6 week placements and I always ensure they have time working with me as an EN so I can educate them on the EN role!

A brief overview of my daily work may include clinical management, screening, phlebotomy, ECG's, recall and referrals, Flu vaccinations only, (I am working on other adult vaccinations at the moment), sterilising equipment, chaperones, assisting with minor surgery, supply ordering, repeat prescriptions, wound-care and many other jobs I can be called upon to help with.

I believe I am a valuable extra set of eyes and ears working within my scope of practice under the direction of a great team of RN's and Doctors. EN's have a big future in Primary Health.
