

Chair report:

Happy International Infection Prevention Week! Thank you for all your enthusiasm and passion for IPC wherever you practice.

I wish all those who put their hand up for the clinical network role the best of luck with the next stages of the interviews.

I'm mindful that there may be uncertainty in teams as the change of government influences the direction of healthcare. I am also cautiously hopeful that the groundwork of the clinical network with enable action on pieces of work that have been stalled - such as the National Infection Prevention and Control Strategy and Antimicrobial Stewardship activities.

The college has been informed that the ACC Infection Treatment Injury Group has wound up. This group looked at strategies to prevent treatment injuries related to infection by partnering with groups to enhance their ideas. Some of the work that has been supported by ACC included ICNet (a computer system) that help IPC practitioners to identify and manage infections in facilities as well as the national SSIS programme. Other work included the Know Your Lines campaign, Infection guiding principles document and the NZ Aseptic Technique. ACC chose to partner with the college to help fund the development of the Fundamentals of IPC programme we run, that programme has now provided basic IPC education for around 100 new practitioners and enabled many of our experienced members to mentor the participants. I am grateful for their work and their commitment to patient safety. I wish Delma and her team every success in their new adventures.

I am looking forward to the AGM on the 1st of Nov and the education session beforehand, and I hope to see many of you online.



Role descriptions and orientation are provided on induction.

Who can be an IPCNC committee member?

You must:

7.0 be a full member of IPCNC i.e. a qualified nurse employed in an IPC role,

8.0 a full financial member of NZNO, and

9.0 have at least two years' work experience in IPC.

What commitment is required from me?

- 10.0 The term of office is two years, with right of re-election for a further two years.
- 11.0 There are three 1-2 day meetings per year, the Annual General Meeting, and some teleconferences.
- 12.0 Travel and accommodation to meetings is covered by the College, as is the bi-annual IPC Conference fee.
- 13.0 NZNO informs your employer of your appointment and their obligations regarding support to your College.
- 14.0 Committee work load is variable, but anticipate about one hour per week. You must have computer access and basic computer literacy.

Fundamentals Programme

Infection Prevention and Control Fundamentals Programme

This course introduces new and existing infection prevention and control practitioners to the key concepts of infection prevention and control (IPC) which underpin IPC practice in all healthcare settings.

The practitioner will complete 8 learning modules via self-directed distance learning, supported by an experienced infection prevention and control mentor. Learning will be enhanced via regular Zoom meetings with your mentor and other course participants.

This course is suitable for a healthcare worker who has a role or an interest in IPC and can commit to around 60 hours of study over 4 months. A certificate will be awarded to participants on completion of the course.

Participants can claim up to 60 professional development hours.

- Standard and Transmission-based Precautions,
- Hand hygiene,
- Microbiology, Surveillance,
- Outbreak Management,
- Communicable Diseases,
- Occupational Health,
- Cleaning, Disinfection and Sterilization, and
- Construction and Renovation.



Cost

The programme is currently supported by listed sponsors, free for NZNO IPCNC members. Non-IPCNC members will be required to pay \$120.

The theme of "Kaitiakitanga – IPC guardians for the future" draws on our role as guardians of our community, sustainability, and looking forward to challenges ahead.

We'd love to talk to you if you have an idea but don't know where to start with a presentation.

Our Keynote speaker, Dr Stephanie Dancer, a UK-based microbiologist, and renowned author on cleaning & disinfection is confirmed to present.

Stephanie is a medical microbiologist at NHS Lanarkshire and Professor of Microbiology at Edinburgh Napier University in Scotland. She edited the *Journal of Hospital Infection* for over 20 years, five of them as editor-in-chief, and now edits for *Infection, Disease & Health*, and *International Journal of Antimicrobial Agents*. She trained at St. Bartholomew's Hospital in London followed by postgraduate studies at Guy's Hospital, where she gained a thesis on the epidemiology and biochemistry of toxin-producing staphylococci. She has worked and travelled all over the world, including the Canadian High Arctic, where she resuscitated 30,000-year-old organisms from glacial ice. She spent six years as Infection Control Officer for Argyll before moving to Health Protection Scotland as their inaugural microbiologist (2002-5). There, she set up MRSA surveillance for



Scotland, evaluated real-time PCR for MRSA screening and helped establish the Scottish Microbiology Forum. She has been a member of various working groups on antibiotic prescribing,



MRSA and hospital cleaning, and is a current or recent member of NHS Scotland Decontamination; NHS Scotland ASSURE; UK NICE (infection control & antimicrobial prescribing); UK HTA (screening and diagnostics); ESCMID groups on infection control (ESGNI), MRSA & multi-resistant Gram-negative bacilli; and 2023 ECCMID conference committee. She advised DEFRA on surface cleaning and hygiene during the COVID-19 pandemic and collaborated with an international group of virologists, physicists, ventilation engineers and aerosol scientists on airborne spread of SARS-CoV-2. She has published books, book chapters and over 200 papers in peer-reviewed journals on hospital cleaning, antimicrobial management, infection control and MRSA. At present, she balances editorial duties with research and teaching, specifically the environmental control of hospital pathogens.

HISTORIC COURNER by Francie M 😂



In my small collection of historic (not pre -historic!!) documents I have a soft bound publication copy of the Auckland Hospital Board Nurse's Lecture Notes MICROBIOLOGY AND PUBLIC HEALTH Revised Edition February **1961**. Reading through this soft bound book I find the section entitled "Medical Asepsis in Nursing Infectious Diseases" and I start to revisit the yesteryear of isolation nursing. In 1961 isolation wards in New Zealand public hospitals were the norm.

For me, in the 1970s, I got to work in our 'TB infirmary' and also in our hospital 'infected wounds' ward — both memorable experiences and both building relics from earlier public health systems! Our TB infirmary required student nurses to do night shift on their own in this very large old three-storey building that had the most antiquated lift that often did not work

AND it was rite of passage to survive these solo night shifts as it was alleged that the building was haunted, and sightings of ghosts and spirits and noises were often spoken of! We, the junior nurses, were assured by those higher up in the nursing hierarchy, aka as 'third years', that the ghosts were no longer infectious! If easily spooked, one could not rely on quick exits via the antiquated lift and the stairs were allegedly THE place where one might meet their supernatural fate!

So back in 1961 nurses were trained in the public hospital settings with hospitals having their own Schools of Nursing. The Auckland Hospital Board had a School of Nursing, and these lecture notes are testament to what was taught to student nurses at this time.

Here are some isolation nursing snippets that may be of interest to you!

'The planning of the Infectious Unit is very important. Construction must provide all amenities – for example, clean and dirty kitchens, adequate sterilising measures including an aerosol chamber, and holding tank. Swing doors are an essential.........'

'Bed spacing 12 feet. Beds 18 inches from wall. Windows open for fresh air and sunshine.......'

'Three types of isolation 1) Complete or Cell or Room Isolation 2) Cubicle Isolation 3) Barrier Isolation...'

'Everything is burnt on vacating the isolation.......gowns gloves masks, toilet requisites, soiled linen, dishes, excreta and discharges, books, papers, toys etc'

'Isolation Equipment includes: gown stand and gowns; trolley containing separate wash basin if running water not available; 2 jugs for water – one hot and one cold, masks in covered container and another covered container for soiled masks, towels, large paper bag for waste pinned to trolley, paper squares, thermometer stand, pressure area tray.'

'On the patient's locker – 2 towels, 2 face flannels, soap in container, sputum mug, supply of rag or paper handkerchiefs, brown paper bag attached to side of locker for reception of soiled handkerchiefs, table napkin.'

'Covered receptacle - for reception of soiled linen.'



AND OF COURSE WHAT ABOUT the DREADED POOS! ??

'In the isolation room.....Bucket - covered, for reception of fluid waste!!'

'In the sluice room – holding tank for disinfection of faeces, urine, washing water. Improvise with covered bucket or kerosene tin if necessary' Tub – of adequate size for soaking soiled linen. Container – covered, for rubber gloves - for bedpan and napkin. Bowl – Pine Disinfectant 1-40 for washing gloved hands.'

Those patients who were diagnosed with spore-forming organisms got lucky! In addition to the above items on the isolation trolley there was a tooth mug and bowl, wash basin, bed pan.


AND THERE'S MOREbut that's for another edition of the Controlla!

So, whilst the past isolation practices may be best left in the past, can you still spot areas where there is residual presence of some of these practices still? We have moved somewhat forwards with our practice application of "isolation nursing", but only because we have learnt so much from our **1961** Auckland Hospital Board Nurse's Lecture Notes in Microbiology and Public Health!

Meeting the educational needs of the novice IPC professional in New Zealand: The 'IPCNC Fundamentals in Infection Prevention and Control programme'

BACKGROUND

- Infection prevention and control (IPC) is a specialised profession that requires knowledge and skills to implement the necessary evidence-based IPC practices in a health facility^{1,2}
- An academic IPC education pathway is not always feasible for novice IPC professionals to acquire IPC competencies when commencing their role
- To meet this need, the New Zealand Infection Prevention and Control Nurses College (IPCNC) developed a short on-line IPC course – delivered free to NZNO IPCNC members since December 2020

ACTIONS

- The Fundamentals of Infection Prevention and Control Programme consists of 10 learning modules (slide 2)
- Students work through the self-directed workbooks over four months to receive their certificate
- Each cohort of six students are supported by an experienced IPC mentor
- Scheduled online meetings enable networking with peers





RESULTS & CONCLUSIONS

8 mentors 30 ~180 students

- Positive student feedback (slide 3)
- Low course drop-out rate
- Suitable for diverse healthcare settings
- Enables confidence and capability
- Sustainable model for ongoing success
