Prof Michael Baker

Epidemiologist, University of Otago

Michael Baker is a public health physician and Professor in the Department of Public Health at the University of Otago, Wellington, where he has worked full-time since 2003.

He has a wide range of public health research interests, with a focus on infectious diseases, environmental health, and improving housing conditions.

His work during 2020-21 has been dominated by assisting with the Covid-19

pandemic response. Michael is a member of the Ministry of Health's Covid-19 Technical Advisory Group and has been the leading architect and advocate for the Covid-19 elimination strategy. His work on public health, and the Covid-19 response in particular, was recognised by a number of awards including: the Critic and Conscience of Society Award (from Universities New Zealand), being made a Member of the NZ Order of Merit (MNZM), his selection as the 2020 Wellingtonian of the Year, and the Prime Minister's Science Communication Prize in 2021.

Ruth Barratt

Infection Prevention and Control Consultant,

Ruth Barratt is a registered nurse, infection preventionist, quality advisor and qualitative researcher. She is credentialed at Expert level with the Australian College of Infection Prevention and Control, holds a Masters in Infection Prevention and Control and has over 23 years of experience in the field across the private and public sectors. Ruth represents the IPCNC on the New Zealand National Infection Control Expert Group. She is part-way through a PhD candidature with a research focus on protective mask behaviours among clinicians.







Prof Stephanie Dancer

NHS Lanarkshire and Professor of Microbiology at Edinburgh Napier University in Scotland

Stephanie is a medical microbiologist in NHS Lanarkshire and Professor of Microbiology at Edinburgh Napier University in Scotland. She edited the Journal of Hospital Infection for over 20 years, five of them as editor-in-chief, and now edits for Infection, Disease & Health and International Journal of Antimicrobial Agents. She trained at St. Bartholomew's Hospital in London followed by postgraduate studies at Guy's Hospital, where she gained a thesis on the epidemiology and biochemistry of toxinproducing staphylococci. She has worked and travelled all over the world, including the Canadian High Arctic, where she resuscitated 30,000-year-old organisms from glacial ice. She

spent six years as Infection Control Officer for Argyll before moving to Health Protection Scotland as their inaugural microbiologist (2002-5). There, she set up MRSA surveillance for Scotland, evaluated real-time PCR for MRSA screening and helped establish the Scottish Microbiology Forum. She has been a member of national working groups on antibiotic prescribing, MRSA and hospital cleaning, and is a current or recent member of NHS Scotland Decontamination; UK NICE (infection control & antimicrobial prescribing); UK HTA (screening and diagnostics); ESCMID groups on infection control, MRSA & multi-resistant Gram-negative bacilli; and 2013 ECCMID conference committee. She is currently advising DEFRA on surface cleaning and hygiene during the Covid-19 crisis and collaborating with an international group of virologists, physicists, ventilation engineers and aerosol scientists on airborne spread of SARS-CoV-2. She has published books, book chapters and around 180 papers in peer-reviewed journals on hospital cleaning, antimicrobial management, infection control and MRSA. At present, she balances editorial duties with research and teaching, specifically antimicrobial stewardship and environmental control of hospital pathogens.

JOINING THE INFECTION PREVENTION & CONTROL NURSES COLLEGE (IPCNC- NZNO) COMMITTEE

WHAT IS THE IPCNC COMMITTEE?

The IPCNC committee is a team of 7 IPC nurse volunteers who provide governance to the IPCNC-NZNO. The IPCNC is one of the NZNO professional colleges. We are supported by a Professional Nursing Advisor from NZNO and receive other financial and legal support from NZNO.

Why join the IPCNC committee?

This opportunity will engage you with other IPC nurses, national IPC policy makers, and give you committee and governance experience. Usually there are three 1–2-day meetings per year. Sometimes these are in a retreat setting, so that new committee members can get to know each other and concentrate on their IPCNC role.

You will hold a national committee role- either as Secretary, Web administrator, Membership coordinator, Publications Officer, or Chairperson. Role descriptions and orientation will be provided.

Who can be an IPCNC Committee member?

Any full member of IPCNC (a qualified nurse employed in an Infection Prevention & Control role, who is a financial member of NZNO) can apply to be on the IPCNC committee. You will need to have at least 2 years previous work experience in the field of infection prevention and control.

What commitment is required from me?

The term of office is 2 years with right of re-election for a further 2 years.

There are three 1–2-day meetings per year, the Annual General Meeting, and some teleconferences. Travel and accommodation to meetings is covered by the College. Admission to the Bi-annual Conference, is also covered by the College.

NZNO informs your Employer of your appointment, to support your work on the College committee.

The Committee workload is variable, however allow 1 hour per week. You will need to have access to a computer and have some computer skills in all roles.

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Introducing

Our New Committee Member:

Sue White: 'Treasurer in waiting'



Well, I am an old trout and have been nursing since I was 18 years old!

Started at a little hospital in Te Kuiti, a 50-bed hospital which did everything, even burr holes! I was a community nurse, also worked in the ward and operating theatre. I remember an accident where we picked out the brain fragments, then placed a made-up plate to cover the brain. The necklace beads had been imbedded under the skin.

The call for something new drew me to join the army. Arrived by train at Waiouru Army camp. A new world of green! In the six-week basic we marched, jumped over obstacles and camped out, just to do some nursing! You got CB (Confined to Barracks: i.e. picking up rubbish, being a runner for camp security etc.) if your room was untidy, your uniform dirty or not ironed - maybe what some people need today!





Finally got to go to the hospital and was welcomed by nursing officers and medics. Small hospital which looked after sick soldiers with all sorts of things. We looked after sailors with diseases they caught having 'free time'. We did medical boards for soldiers going overseas: we gave them vaccinations for everything and assessed their fitness. We had several outbreaks of hepatitis A, measles, and influenza. Isolation and cohorting twenty men in barracks: easy! I went in the ambulance to cover live tank firing, big guns and exercises with Americans and Singaporeans. I stitched up drunken men after fisticuffs (even stitched a tongue).

After two years I did my general nursing training in Auckland. Three years of an amazing learning curve. Even looked after the last woman in an iron lung! Went to Waikato hospital after that; oh, forgot, got married as well. Who you ask? Yes, it was a soldier, he was posted to Ngaruawahia (hence me going to Waikato). I worked in the operating theatre there and commuted on my trusty motorcycle. "Gosh" you say, "even in the cold foggy days?" Yes, coming to work in my wet weather gear I got called The Golden Peril!

On again, following the man to Burnham Army camp. I had two children and worked at St Georges and Southern Cross hospitals as well: multitasking! Then to Linton Army camp. Normally the soldier goes first, and family follows later. "What job do you want?" "Anything" I said. "Well, there's a job in Recovery at a private hospital." "I can do that - put my name down."

In Palmy I was interviewed - by a nun! Of course, Mercy Hospital was run by nuns and Sister Lucia looked very staunch in a white uniform. I must have done something right, cause I got the job. Just two of us in Recovery and me in a striped uniform; a bit different! Sister Lucia then asked if I would like to do infection control. What's that? A requirement for every hospital. Yes, with my can-do attitude again there's nothing I couldn't do!

It was a steep learning curve, thank God for Berry Bird. She filled in all the blanks and guided me through from scratch. Everything, all the policies and procedures, education and equipment, wow! Step by step we got there, even passed the audits! 27 years later I was still 'chasing bugs'. Got dragged into doing two conferences with Berry at the helm: lots of fun and experience.

In my twilight now, it was time to give back and so I joined the IPCNC committee. They suggested I take on the Treasurer's job! Can-do attitude to the fore. The joke might be on them, as not much bug chasing unless they give me the cash!

HISTORIC COURNER

The Carpet Conundrum:

How many of us have had the opportunity (or misfortune some might be heard to groan!) to be part of decision making and influencing for facility design and interior finishes? The participation by infection prevention and control professionals is critical to ensure that environmental



hygiene principles are upheld. It is concerning that many IPC professionals struggle to have this included in their role. Often the organisational understanding of the role of IPC in these projects is lacking, and IPC gets involved only once things have gone wrong, and then IPC is expected to perform a 'miracle' to meet IPC principles. This may place IPC in "the fighting corner", which is disheartening. We hope the tide is turning now and anecdotally, COVID has shone the spotlight on IPC and what value we bring to the design table.

Flooring choices in healthcare environments should be a 'no brainer', where common sense prevails. But common sense varies; some people have very little and others way too much!

Is it not the holy grail of IPC to reject carpet flooring and champion trustworthy, resilient,



and easy clean vinyl flooring?

Carpet can seem 'posh'. In the home rugs and wall-towall is strongly associated with comfort, Its history is pre-biblical, and folklore references the luxury of carpet, such as in the rich trade between nations, inclusion in dowries, and in some cases, magical qualities (think *Aladdin*)!





In healthcare environments, particularly hospitals, floor traffic is heavy and complex, involving beds, equipment, laundry waste and linen. Floor covering must be durable. Vinyl meets this challenge and of course, it is so much easier, though not necessarily cheaper, to keep it clean.

Vinyl appears to outwit carpet on many bases, but what evidence is there that vinyl in healthcare is better than carpet?

One early study by Anderson, Mackel, Stoler and Millison (1982) in the Journal of Clinical Microbiology, investigated microbiology associated with carpets in hospitals. Over 11months or so children were inpatients in rooms with and without carpet. Patients, carpet, and floor samples were examined, and the diseases in patients correlated to microorganisms cultured from flooring. There were more specific microbial organisms recovered from carpet samples than from bare floor samples. Patients had more positive microorganism cultures if they had been cared for in a carpeted room. However, active microbiology disease in patients was neither associated with organisms contaminating the carpet nor the bare floor. This study concluded that there was no association between contamination of the carpet and healthcare associated infection.

Harris (2015) examined the influence of three hospital flooring types on environmental stressors. Noise is a major environmental stressor in a hospital environment. Harris examined three flooring materials, terrazzo, rubber, and carpet tile in patient corridors comparing sound absorption, comfort, light reflectance, employee perceptions and preferences, and patient satisfaction. Carpet tile performed better for sound attenuation by absorption, reducing noise by 3.14 dB. Healthcare staff and patients preferred quieter flooring. This comprehensive study concluded that flooring, which is comfortable underfoot, easy to clean, and absorbs sound improves healthcare worker job satisfaction and patient satisfaction.

Last, but by no means least, consider the technological improvements of carpet products. Carpet tiles are durable, easy to clean, and a single tile can be replaced.

As IPC becomes more proactive, healthcare design will consider the IPC principles of environmental hygiene more effectively. Of course, there will always be challenging environments where the floor is included in the point of patient care, and in these situations the 'no carpet' rule may become non -negotiable. The IPC position on carpet does have a few 'loops in its pile'!

Infection Prevention and Control Orientation Course



This course introduces new and existing infection prevention and control practitioners to the key concepts of infection prevention and control (IPC) which underpin IPC practice in all healthcare settings.

The practitioner will complete 9-10 learning modules via self-directed distance learning, supported by an experienced infection prevention and control mentor. Learning will be enhanced via regular Zoom meetings with your mentor and other course participants.

Travel and Education Scholarship Report – Michelle Keat
