Critical Management Procedures

	Comments
Step 1a	
Comply fully with the International Code of Marketing of Breast-milk Substitutes and relevant World Health Assembly resolutions.	

Step 1b Have a written infant feeding policy	
that is routinely communicated to staff, access holders and parents.	
Step 1c	
Establish ongoing monitoring and data-management systems.	
Key Clinical Practices	
Step 2	
Ensure that staff has sufficient knowledge, competence	
and skills to support breastfeeding.	
Step 3	
Discuss the importance and management of breastfeeding with pregnant women and their families.	

Step 4 Facilitate immediate and uninterrupted skin-to-skin contact and support mothers to initiate breastfeeding as soon as possible after birth and any opportunity thereafter.	
Step 5	
Support mothers to initiate and maintain breastfeeding and lactation to manage common difficulties or when baby is unable to be with mother.	
Step 6	
Do not provide breastfed newborns any food or fluids other than breast milk, unless clinically indicated.	

Step 7 Enable mothers and their infants to remain together and to practise rooming-in 24 hours a day.	
Step 8	
Support mothers to recognize and respond to their infants' cues for feeding.	
Step 9	
Counsel mothers on the use and risks of feeding bottles, teats and	
pacifiers.	
Step 10	
Coordinate discharge so that parents/whanau and their infants	
have timely access to ongoing support and care.
