Nursing Research Section BGM 2025 Recap

Date: 10 October 2025

Venue: NZNO Christchurch

Dr. Isaac Amankwaa, a Senior Lecturer in Nursing at AUT, presented his groundbreaking research on *"Evolving Nursing Roles in Assisted Dying: Insights for an Ideal Service Model."* His work, which focuses on health equity, migrant health literacy, and assisted dying, provides crucial insights into the changing landscape of nursing in the context of end-of-life care.

Key Findings:

 Expanding Scope of Nursing Practice: Dr. Amankwaa highlighted how nursing roles are evolving to include more responsibilities in assisted dying processes, reflecting a broader shift towards nurse-led care models.

- 2. **Health Equity Health Considerations**: The research emphasised the importance of ensuring equitable access to assisted dying services, addressing disparities that may exist for migrant and minority populations.
- 2. **Workforce Development**: Dr. Amankwaa stressed the need for comprehensive training and support for nurses involved in assisted dying, ensuring they are well-equipped to handle the complex emotional and ethical aspects of their role.
- 3. **Ideal Service Model**: The presentation proposed an ideal service model that integrates nursing expertise with interdisciplinary collaboration, enhancing the quality and compassion of end-of-life care.
- 4. **Advancing Nursing Practice**: By synthesising emerging evidence, Dr. Amankwaa's work aims to advance nursing practice, ensuring that nurses are at the forefront of providing dignified and respectful care to patients choosing assisted dying.

The audience was captivated by Dr. Amankwaa's insights, which offer a roadmap for developing a more inclusive and effective approach to assisted dying, ultimately benefiting both patients and healthcare providers.

Summary of Research Findings: Graduate Entry Nursing Students' Development of a Professional Nursing Self

Dr. Patricia McClunie-Trust, a Principal Lecturer at Wintec, presented her research on "*Graduate Entry Nursing Students' Development of a Professional Nursing Self.*" Her work, which focuses on professionalism and professional practice in nursing, provides valuable insights into the development of nursing students as they transition into the profession.

Key Findings:

1. **Professional Identity Formation**: Dr. McClunie-Trust's research highlights the critical role of graduate entry programs in shaping students' professional identities, emphasising the importance of a supportive and inclusive learning environment.

- 2. **Capability Development**: The study underscores the need for advanced nursing practice capabilities, including clinical skills, ethical decision-making, and leadership qualities, which are essential for graduates entering the nursing workforce.
- 3. **Professional Practice**: Dr. McClunie-Trust's findings suggest that a strong foundation in professional practice is crucial for students to navigate the complexities of real-world nursing, ensuring they are well-prepared to meet the demands of the profession.
- 4. **Supervision and Mentorship**: The research emphasises the value of professional supervision and mentorship in fostering the development of a professional nursing self, providing students with guidance and support as they grow into their roles.
- 5. **Advanced Nursing Practice**: By focusing on capability development, Dr. McClunie-Trust's work aims to advance nursing practice, ensuring that graduates are not only competent but also confident and capable of providing high-quality care.

Dr. McClunie-Trust's insights offer a comprehensive understanding of the challenges and opportunities in developing a professional nursing self, providing a framework for enhancing nursing education and practice.

Summary of Research Findings: Kawa Whakaruruhau: A Framework for Culturally Safe Practice with Māori

Chey, a Nurse Educator Māori at MidCentral, presented her innovative research on "Kawa Whakaruruhau: A Framework for Enabling Culturally Safe Practice with Māori." Her work is dedicated to supporting kaupapa Māori approaches to clinical education and workforce development, with a focus on empowering health professionals to deliver culturally safe and equity-focused care.

Key Findings:

1. **Culturally Safe Practice**: Chey's framework uses Irihapeti Ramsden emphasises the importance of cultural safety in healthcare, ensuring that Māori patients receive care that respects and incorporates their cultural values and beliefs.

- 2. **Empowerment of Health Professionals**: The research highlights strategies for empowering health professionals to deliver care that is not only clinically competent but also culturally responsive, fostering trust and better health outcomes for Māori patients.
- 3. **Te Tiriti o Waitangi in Clinical Practice**: Chey's work underscores the significance of actualising Te Tiriti o Waitangi in clinical settings, promoting equity and partnership in healthcare delivery.
- 4. **Collaborative Education**: The framework encourages collaborative approaches to education, integrating Māori perspectives and knowledge to enhance the learning experiences of health professionals.
- 5. **Workforce Development**: Chey's research informs educational initiatives aimed at developing a healthcare workforce that is culturally competent and committed to equity-focused care.
- 6. **Seminal Influence**: Chey draws upon the seminal work of Irihapeti Ramsden, who was pivotal in embedding Kawa Whakaruruhau in nursing practice, providing a robust foundation for her framework.

As a role model for emerging Māori researchers, Chey's contributions are instrumental in shaping more inclusive and culturally safe healthcare practices, ensuring that the unique needs and perspectives of Māori patients are at the forefront of nursing education and practice.

Nursing Research Highlights and Innovation

ICU/HDU NetP Clinical Transition Programme: Supporting New Graduate Nurses in Critical Care

The NetP Clinical Transition Programme (CTP), launched in 2025 by North Shore Hospital's ICU/HDU Education Team, is a structured initiative aimed at supporting newly graduated nurses entering critical care environments. Developed in response to feedback highlighting the challenges of transitioning into ICU/HDU settings

—such as high acuity and inconsistent preceptorship—the programme seeks to standardise education, reinforce procedural knowledge, and build clinical confidence.

Led by Nurse Educators Charmaine Van Heerden and Justine Echavez, alongside Clinical Coaches Monica McGrath, Jing Ying Chuang, and Jean Abraham, the team was nominated for the Better Best Brilliant Award by Te Whatu Ora Waitematā, recognising their dedication to nursing excellence.

The 24-week programme includes several key components:

- **CTP Days**: Six non-clinical days focused on theoretical and practical skills, including physical assessments, documentation, and complex ICU care procedures.
- Passport Days: These interspersed sessions involve e-learning and supervised skill assessments, covering tasks like high-flow oxygen setup and non-invasive ventilation care.
- **EPICCZ Module**: An eLearning induction programme introducing critical care principles through structured modules.
- **ICU Workbook**: From week 13, nurses delve into advanced ICU specific topics such as ABG interpretation, ECG analysis, and fluid balance, followed by educator review to ensure proper understanding.

The programme is designed to be paced and supportive, with weekly progress tracking and feedback opportunities. Early feedback has been positive, indicating that the initiative is effectively easing the transition for new graduates. The education team takes pride in fostering growth, safety, and compassion in critical care nursing through this innovative and empowering programme.
