Meeting with NZNO President (Grant Brookes)

Issues raised

- PDRP for primary health care nurses. Portfolios are being assessed by nonprimary health care nurse practitioners, some college members feel this is a disadvantage. Unacceptable variation in application of process geographically and by sector'
- 2. Executive are concerned about workforce issues particularly new graduate nurses in primary health care. The difficulties are the restrictions around



Health workforce funding. Kim Carter suggested for advocacy towards Health workforce and DHBs to re-think strategies around funding for primary health care in particular considering the size of our primary care nursing workforce. Under-used funding and with many restrictions.

NZNO Leadership, Grant and Kerri met with Health workforce with NETP as their top priority. DHBs are unable to employ enough to take on board the subsidy.

HWNZ they will get principles developed to unlock the silos (specialties) for NZNO.

- 3. Primary health care MECA: This is due to be renegotiated later this year however it does not cover, nurse leadership positions, Nurse practitioner, practice assistant or senior (designated) nurse positions. NZCPHCN have advocated that for the next negotiations the MECCA must include and reflect these roles of primary health care nursing.
- 4. Nurse Practitioner registration: Kate asked the question, what is NZNO stance on this. It can take a long time from submission to interview. NZNO found the physician assistant registration flawed.

Meeting with New Zealand Nursing Council (Carolyn Reed and Pam Doole)

Carolyn Reed-CEO NCNZ Pam Doole-Manager Strategic Policy NCNZ

1/Nurse Practitioner Programme

There is an increase in applications for NP registration. 2015 many did not meet criteria and NCNZ are supporting their re-submissions and supporting new NP candidates.

2/Designated Nurse Prescribing

The application for prescribing rights for registered nurses working in primary health and specialty care teams is with the Ministry of Health. The Ministry of Health is working collaboratively with NZNC and the draft regulations have been prepared. NCNZ is currently developing an implementation timeframe and a transition process for the currents diabetes nurses training and diabetes nurse prescribing. Pharmac have a process to review process for subsidies for nurse prescribers which is very time consuming.

NCNZ is also preparing advice to employers, advice to the public, and consideration of a future RN scope. The idea is that this pathway will empower nurse prescribers to continue onto the nurse practitioner pathway.



3/Over the counter medications

There are restrictions on nurse prescribing and supplying over the counter medications because of pharmac restrictions.

The department of corrections raised with NCNZ that nurses should not need a standing order to supply over the counter medications.

Part of pharmacs processes is subsidies are linked to prescribers which restricts nurses.

Nurse's scope is evidently evolving, administration of meds is usually held by RNs. Government model of care, is proving that most care is done in the community and this will evolve.

4/Student nurse placements:

Nursing programmes must have PHC nursing in their curriculum. All nursing schools are reviewed by NZNO. Our health system is preparing for a future more focused on PHC, NCNZ are monitoring this also. Rural nursing, an integration programme for nursing students would be ideal as raised by a committee member.

There is still the notion that student nurses must do surgical/medical nursing before working in PHC which is not evidence based and is not a notion supported by either NCNZ or NZCPHCN.

Nursing Council of New Zealand Projects

1/First application for RN nurse prescribing is high priority project. Likely to be implemented in July-Sept.

2/Community nurse prescribing project depends on government process and how they respond to it. It took the first application approx. a year to be signed off by government then 3 months to be put in a draft. So it is a timely process.

3/Nurse Practitioner completed a 2nd consultation.

The 1st was around scope of practice and the removal of "specific area of practice". Also should there be a specific NP programme, to identify and develop a pathway that would effectively support candidates. The 2nd consultation was around education standards, competencies and the registration process. A need for



significant changes in registration process. NCNZ have looked at international models in terms of their registration processes for NP. There are not many alternatives, other international alternatives have huge populations. The Australian model assesses within their education programme, rather than an interview panel, then submits the portfolio to council. The bulk of portfolios have reduced in size which is positive. NCNZ has had a good response, the councils proposals are getting supported with accepted concerns and suggestions. NCNZ have done a submissions analysis. They have identified more discussion is needed on how education providers can assess and manage portfolios. It is possible that the panel interview process will be redundant later in the future.

Feedback from NZCPHC committees is that NP candidates are successful throughout the entire process but then stumble at the interview process. NCNZ have done an analysis about unsuccessful candidates, and have identified patterns, themes etc and are developing strategies to better support them.

4/Internationally qualified nurse transition to NZ project. The current environment is DHBs are saving money, there are more NZ nurse graduates with fewer graduates going to Australia. Good supply of NZ trained nurses for now, but highly likely to have a nursing shortage in the future. Other nations are now experiencing nursing shortages. NCNZ doing strategic planning for this future.
