On the Horizon – Keep an Eye Out!

<u>Pharmac has released a proposal to</u> fund a triple medicine inhaler (ICS/LAMA/LABA) for patients with moderate to severe COPD from 1st May, 2024. Having the option of this novel funded triple combination treatment (fluticasone furoate with umeclidinium and vilanterol [Trelegy Ellipta) would mean that patients only need to use one inhaler to achieve ICS/LABA/LAMA combination treatment (instead of two or three), which may improve treatment adherence.

COVID-19 Booster

The new COVID-19 vaccine, <u>Comirnaty Omicron XBB.1.5</u>, recently <u>approved by Medsafe</u> for people aged 12 years and older (as reported in <u>Bulletin 91</u>) will be available for use from <u>7th March, 2024</u>. There are currently no changes to COVID-19 vaccine eligibility criteria.

Influenza 2024

The 2024 flu vaccine will be available to eligible people (for all people y5 years and over, people with long-term conditions (like asthma and diabetes), those who are pregnant, and people with specific mental health conditions). These will be available from 2nd April 2024

Nursing role in Global Respiratory Health

This session included 10 short presentations based on nursing research/studies from various countries. While many of the findings/recommendations where not entirely new some where an extension on current knowledge.

- 1. Having a standardised language (SL) for respiratory nursing care is desirable, technical and advanced nursing language, SL are not used by nurses in Spain at the moment
- 2. Preferences for asthma decision making focus groups with low income and racial, Black American have higher rates and die at three times the rates.
- 3. Use of non-invasive ventilation in palliative care and end if life care in patients with advanced COPD Cochrane review
- 4. Extend and Characterisation of under diagnosis and misclassification of COPD in Sweden.
- 5. Assessing impact of dedicated Advanced Nurse Practitioners in the provision of ILD services 25% increase in number of cases at multi disciplinary team meetings, improved management and outcomes.
- 6. Modifiable factors of uncontrolled asthma crucial role of the asthma nurse. Asthma nurses have skills and ability to improve asthma management.
- 7. The under diagnosis and treatment of symptoms of anxiety in COPD is common and can adversely affect patient outcomes. Anxiety and depression have a significant impact on physical functioning, breathlessness, quality of life, exacerbation rates, use of health care resources, length of hospital stay, readmission rates and mortality. Addressing mental health was most effective strategy to improving self-management in COPD.
- 8. Effectiveness of Pulmonary Rehabilitation programme preliminary results from Rehab 2 Life study.
- 9. Existing Respiratory Nursing Curriculum International Coalition for Respiratory Nursing (ICRN). The ICRN was formed for the development of a harmonised syllabus and curriculum for respiratory nurses with the aim of empowering the nurses delivering respiratory care towards an active role in the health systems across the globe. Identified there were a lack of co-ordinated educational programmes specifically for respiratory care and nurses. ICRN highly recommends that future steps need to be invested in the education of respiratory specialist nurses, which can plan an important role in supporting prevention and improvements in care in patients with asthma and COPD. This presentation included information on GARD as below.

The Global Alliance against Chronic Respiratory Disease (GARD), was launched in 2006, is a global network of stakeholders with a vision of "a world where all people breathe freely".

- Asthma and COPD are a growing and evolving global health emergency affecting people from all countries, socioeconomic statuses and age groups
- Approximately half a billion people live with asthma and COPD and together these two conditions cause almost 4 million deaths every year.
- More than 1 million of these deaths occur "prematurely" in people aged under 70 years. 90% of these premature deaths occur in low and middle-income countries.
