2019 NZNO Conference Report

The 2019 NZNO Conference "Leaving No One Behind - Health For All" was held on Wednesday, 18 September at the Museum of New Zealand Te Papa Tongarewa, Wellington.

It followed a Special General Meeting held on Monday, 16 September at which Grant Brooks narrowly retained his position as NZNO President and the Annual General Meeting and Colleges & Sections afternoon held on Tuesday 17 September.



Keynote Speaker

Dr Jamie Boyd, PhD, a Professor at the University of Hawai'i and Family Health Nurse Practitioner opened the conference with her presentation "Expanding Historical Nursing Roles To Include Holistic Healing Practices In Response To The Health Needs Of Communities" and set the scene for the day.

PUTANGA

In her presentation Dr Boyd discussed holistic nursing and spiritual holism. She discussed how we can better support clients and communities to achieve their perceived highest level of well-being and how we can begin integrating holistic care and theory into practice, education and training as well as how she incorporates complementary and alternative (CAM) therapies into her daily practice

The highlight (even with all its horrifying statistics!)

The absolute highlight of the conference for me was the third presentation of the day by **Children's Commissioner Judge Andrew Becroft.** Judge Becroft was appointed a District Court Judge in 1996. In 2001, he became the Principal Youth Court Judge of New Zealand; a role that he held until he was appointed the Children's Commissioner in 2016.



Judge Becroft is a dynamic presenter who held the audience's attention with several t-shirt changes and some fairly disturbing statistics about child health in New Zealand.

His presentation outlined our four biggest challenges: 1. Understanding the impact of "child poverty". 2. Doing better for at risk tamariki Māori and Pasifika children and young people. 3. Understanding the prevalence and effects of neurodevelopmental disabilities and 4. Being truly "child-centred".

Focus on Pacifica Health

The three subsequent presentations centred around Tongan health: **Dr Sione Vaka**'s presentation "*Pacific Mental Health*" outlined his research into Tongan Mental Health. Registered Nurse **Annalyn 'Ulangā** gave a presentation entitled "*Hospice Nurses: Vital link in meeting cultural and palliative needs in terminally ill Tongan patients and their families*" and **Seletute Vave Patterson**'s presentation "*School-based health care through an equity lens*" outlined her work outlined typical health scenarios she sees as a Public Health Nurse at Auckland District Health Board.

Breakout Sessions

The day ended with 3 breakout sessions. Delegates were able to attend one of three presentations:

- "Health Equity For Rough Sleepers" by Garrick Martin a Mental Health Nurse at Auckland DHB
- *"Anyone For Tennis?"* by Kate Calvert, Service Planning & Integration Managerat at Hutt Valley DHB
- *"Mental Health Screening Tool Iin Canterbury Prisons"* by Heather Symes a Registered Nurse at Te Whare Rangihau, the Forensic Community Team based at Hillmorton Hospital in Christchurch

I attended Garrick Martin's excellent presentation about Health Equity for Rough Sleepers where he discussed definitions and degrees and described homelessness as a socially generated health crisis caused by 4intergenerational trauma, mass incarceration, a housing 'crisis' amongst other things. He discussed co-existing problems – ie: a lifetime prevalence of psychosis in 23% for men and 46% for women compared to 1% in the broader community and an almost 50% prevalence of alcohol disorders in men. He discussed the health services response his team had implemented to encourage contact ie: Engagement focused relationship, Outreach and Mobile services, Drop in and co-location of clinics, and collaborations with other mental health services. It was an interesting and truly though provoking presentation and I came away with an excellent contact for guidance about how better to engage a homeless person needing assessment and treatment should I need it.

Did you know that the Women's Health College has a small education fund of \$5,000 per annum available to assist members with ongoing professional development?

Did you know that we never use the entire \$5000 set aside each year for members because we never get enough applications!?!

Do you have an education or study day, a course or conference that you think will expand your knowledge and positively enhance your care of patients and their whanau?

Apply now!

The applications are assessed quarterly at the Women's Health College Committee face-to-face meetings. While meeting dates vary, applications must be received by 1 February, 1 May, 1 July and 1 October each year.

Criteria for applications

- Members must have belonged to the Women's Health College for a minimum of 2 years at the time of their application
- A College member can only apply for funding once every 3 years, i.e. a subsequent application will only be accepted for review 3 years after the date of the previous application.
- \$400 per person is the maximum contribution
- Retrospective applications cannot be accepted
- Funding goes to the person who applied and cannot be transferred to another person
- All successful funding recipients must write a short report about what they learned on their education/conference/course, and how it has improved their practice and send it to the College. This report will be published in a subsequent Women's Health College newsletter.

I recently attended a study day on Maori Health Nursing at Ara In Christchurch and had to complete a case study assignment. Something I haven't done for a few years.

I found the study day interesting. We had an update on our local and national statistics relating to Maori health and the predicted issues in the future for Canterbury.

There was talk about the issues the Maori face in our public health system, One speaker talked about how this paper has changed her practice. I enjoyed the day and meeting nurses who work in other areas and their challenges in their work places.

I then spent many hours reading the suggested reading which I gave me an insight on the culture and in particular their spirituality and values within their families.

I was interested in the Hui Process now taught to medical students in Otago Medical School and try to bring some of the knowedge I have gained to my practice although we have time limits with our patients in an outpatient setting.

I am pleased to say I got my case study completed in time and I passed.
