An overview of stoma-related complications and their management.

Topics include the important role played by community nurses in assisting people with stoma, the complications related to the stoma and to the peristomal skin, and referring patients to the specialist stoma care nurse when repeated stoma-related problems are reported.

Best practice in stoma care for neonates and children: The Global Paediatric Stoma Nurses Advisory Board has issued guidelines to help clinicians achieve consistent best practice *Nursing Children and Young People.* (2019, Sep). 31(5), 12-13.

Many people are unaware that neonates and children can have stomas, and even fewer recognise the special challenges involved in their stoma care. 'Stoma nurses are also essential in the educational process because they are the first point of call for children and their families.

Intestinal stomas are formed for emergency, elective, benign and malignant conditions. They may be temporary or permanent. The complication rates of intestinal stomas are reported as high as 56%. The aim of this article is to provide an overview of intestinal stomas and common related issues, to inform general practitioners (GPs) and improve stoma-related care.

A colostomy creates an opening from the colon to the outside of the body through the abdominal wall. An ileostomy creates an opening from the ileum to the outside of the body through the abdominal wall. The opening created by a colostomy or an ileostomy is called a stoma.

How to change a stoma bag

Each patient will have different stoma care needs, which may include the need for psychological support. Changing a patient's stoma bag is an opportunity to teach them how to undertake the procedure themselves, so that they are eventually able to undertake their stoma care independently. Optimal support systems for patients with stomas - an opinion piece

However, some of the published data related to stoma care were extrapolated to enable the reader to understand the important role that support systems can play in the acceptance of the stoma.

Peristomal skin complications: causes, effects, and treatments

Enterostomal formation remains a necessary part of multiple types of surgeries. Stomal difficulties can be a source of frustration for patients; however, a properly functioning stoma in a patient educated in its care can result in a highly functional individual, with a high quality of life, comparable to a person without a stoma. Correct surgical technique is vital to creating a stoma that is sufficiently everted, and in a good anatomical location.

Since then she's discovered it's "the best job ever".
